Chairman's Report

The Foundation had one of its most eventful years in 2013. We made record progress on many fronts: our scholarships; our projects in education, health, community development and microbusiness; and our fundraising. But, at the same time, we encountered some testing obstacles, particularly in our efforts to build the Kokoda College.

We awarded another 330 scholarships and supported 40 schools with the educational resources they need to operate. We built the Naduri Elementary School and Enivilogo Elementary School and we are working on new classrooms in Buna, Sanananda and Manari.

We funded the salaries of 25 committed elementary teachers, allowing them to keep open the schools along and around the Track and to provide access to a high quality education to children in remote communities.

Similarly, our dedicated health workers have operated aid posts along and around the Track providing vital healthcare to very remote communities, often for the first time. And we have been able to expand our programs in microbusiness, agriculture, food security and solar lighting during the year.

This progress was possible because of the continued generosity of our funding support base, highlighted by the 2013 Ralph Honner Oration Dinner, which was a sellout, and with the proceeds from the auctions raised around \$80,000 after expenses.

A combination of logistic and bureaucratic bottlenecks and weather temporarily slowed our progress in constructing the College campus. Nevertheless, we are confident that we will be able to complete the campus during 2014.

Our selfless and tireless team - led by our CEO Dr Gen Nelson and supported by Vera, Petra, Jonathan and Rebecca in Australia and Saii, Wampy, Grayson, Theo, and Elijah in PNG - met the challenges, often working long hours hampered by frustrating communication difficulties.

Petra Arifeae and her husband Charles answered our call at the eleventh hour to rush to Kou Kou to take command of the College campus creation after the unforeseen withdrawal of our project manager. They drew on their wide experience - Petra as a school principal and Charles as an engineer - and they performed magnificently under great pressure. We owe them a great debt of gratitude.

The year in prospect is an exciting one. We believe that the Kokoda College project will be a 'game changer', bringing with it wide-ranging benefits for the Kokoda catchment region. Once established, it has the potential to benefit the nation as a whole.

In anticipation of establishing the College, we put funds aside in 2012 that were spent in 2013. For this reason, the Foundation recorded a surplus in 2012 and a deficit in 2013.

Our Executive Director, Dr Gen Nelson, is taking maternity leave. We wish her, James and their baby daughter, Emilie, well. Gen plans to take a six-month leave period and then return to her role.

Gen managed her pregnancy during a tumultuous period for the Foundation. She has handled the pressure with aplomb. In her absence Bernie Egan is taking the reins with our team all stepping up to share additional responsibilities.

Thank you to everyone who supported the Foundation in 2013. Your generosity has once again kept the spirit of Kokoda alive and in action.

Executive Director's Report

2013 has been another year of great inspiration for both myself and the Kokoda Track Foundation. Every day we are inspired by the communities along and around the Kokoda Track in which we work. We are inspired by the commitment and dedication of our teachers and health workers who sacrifice so much to see their communities thrive and prosper. We are inspired by the children who receive our scholarships and who are achieving the most extraordinary results - both in their own lives and in impacting the lives of those around them. And we are particularly inspired by the generosity and goodwill of the many individuals and organisations which make it all possible.

This year, we once again relied on the generosity of financial and in-kind contributions from individuals, organisations, corporate partners, NGOs, schools, philanthropists and many others across both Australia and PNG. Thank you, our valued supporters, for continuing to show us your overwhelming generosity. You have displayed enormous vision for our nearest neighbour and your trust in and support of the Foundation provides us with our lifeline and enables us to continue to grow and reach more people throughout the region.

The strong support and confidence placed in us by hundreds across our two countries enabled us to continue embarking upon our biggest project ever – the creation and construction of the Kokoda College. There are currently more than 500,000 schoolaged children across PNG who cannot go to school due to the lack of teachers. Based on these numbers, PNG urgently needs to train 12,500 new teachers before it can contemplate offering universal primary education. In health, the rate of maternal and child death in PNG is staggeringly high – among the highest in the world – and the main contributing factor to this is the lack of primary healthcare and maternal and child health services available for PNG's rural poor.

The key to breaking the cycle of infant and maternal mortality in PNG and to provide universal access to education, is to give rural communities access to basic aid post facilities and elementary schools. Crucial to these facilities being able to properly operate are qualified and committed community health workers and elementary teachers. The Foundation's Kokoda College project is hoping to break this cycle. From next year, the Kokoda College will operate a School of Education, that will train elementary and primary teachers, and a School of Health, that will train

community health workers. It will be one of only a few PNG Colleges based in a rural area and will have the capacity to train and graduate 80 teachers and 30 community health works every year. After graduation, these professionals will be posted into their home villages and will operate the remote schools and aid posts across rural PNG – bringing these vital services to where they are needed the most.

2013 was the real beginning of this exciting initiative. We began constructing the College campus, we developed and piloted the innovative learning program and curriculum to be run out of the project, and we worked alongside local communities to build the vision for a healthy and educated rural Kokoda Track catchment region. We look to 2014 and beyond with much hope and anticipation and we know that the best is ahead of us.

I also continue to draw great inspiration from the amazing team behind the Kokoda Track Foundation – our dedicated board, our hard-working and motivated Sydney staff, and our team of project officers, teachers and community health workers in PNG – the nuts and bolts of our organisation. Thank you to all of you for your extraordinary commitment to keeping the spirit of Kokoda alive and for always going beyond the call of duty.

In 2014 I am embarking on my biggest personal journey to date as my husband James and I became first-time parents in January. As I take a brief period of maternity leave, I am very conscious of just how lucky we are in Australia to have access to high quality child and maternal health services. Bringing these services to the developing world has to be one of the greatest and most pressing challenges of our time. The Kokoda Track Foundation is at the coalface of making this a reality for our friends in PNG.



BUILDING EDUCATIONAL CAPACITY IN COMMUNITIES

SCHOOL RESOURCE PROGRAM

Schools across the region often struggle to access the educational resources they need to operate. For over a decade, the Foundation has supported the educational needs of 40 elementary, primary and secondary schools across our region. In 2013, we delivered Rich Learning Resource Kits to every elementary school across the Kokoda Track catchment region. Also, our 40 elementary, primary and high schools were able to order their own supplies via our School Resource Program and purchased a wide variety of items including stationery, textbooks, library books, furniture, curriculum resources and teaching materials. Schools in the Koiari region are particularly remote and struggle to access their supplies. Our schools of Naoro 2, Manari, Efogi 1, Efogi 2, Sogeri, Edevu, Naduri, Kagi and Kavovo all purchased items that were then delivered by either foot or air and these resources kept schools open and operating in 2013. Our investment in resources, as well as teachers and children, results in the provision of a quality education for all children along and around the Track.



There is still a great need for many more school buildings to be constructed across our region in order for universal free education to become a reality. The Kokoda Track Foundation partners with local communities to construct school classrooms - often in very difficult to access and remote locations. This year we constructed the Naduri Elementary School, Enivilogo Elementary School and started work with the local community on the new classroom at the Manari Community School - all in the Koiari region. We also ran this program in the Northern Beaches region and supported the Buna Elementary School and Sanananda Elementary School with new classrooms. Permanent, quality, and waterproof classrooms are vital for teachers and schools to operate effectively - giving children a safe place to learn within a rich and constructive learning environment.

INVESTING IN HIGH QUALITY TEACHERS

TEACHER SUPPORT PROGRAM

Our investment in education includes vital support of teacher salaries to keep schools open across the region. In the Koiari region we support teacher postings at: Naoro 2, Manari, Efogi 1, Efogi 2, Naduri and Kagi schools. In total, the Foundation supported the positions of 25 elementary and community teachers across the region in 2013, creating vital opportunities for children living in remote areas to go to school. Without this support, these schools would simply close their doors and children across the region would miss out on an education.

PROMOTING HEALTHY COMMUNITIES

BRIGHTEN A SMILE

After startling research findings unveiled the severity of tooth decay and other oral health issues along and around the Track, the Foundation began its Brighten a Smile program in 2013. We work in conjunction with all 40 schools supported by the Foundation's School Resource Program including 13 schools in the Koiari region. We developed a unique training program for use in Papua New Guinea and our expert dental volunteers trained our community health workers in the program. These health workers then work alongside our teachers who conduct daily toothbrushing classes and weekly oral hygiene classes with children attending elementary and primary schools throughout the region. Partnering with Colgate Palmolive, we delivered 6,000 toothbrushes and toothpastes throughout the region... brightening the smiles of children everywhere.







"The relief of dental pain by both the control and prevention of dental disease is an increasing and important problem to solve for many nations of the world. From interviews with community health workers of the Kokoda Track region, they all identified tooth decay as the number one health care problem... KTF's dental health prevention program for school children, that involves toothbrushing with fluoride toothpaste regularly, will reduce tooth decay by up to 50%" (Dr Barry Reed)

EMPOWERING WOMEN & COMMUNITIES

LIGHTING UP THE TRACK

It is currently estimated that only 7% of Papua New Guineans are connected to the electricity grid. Villagers often have no choice but to burn expensive and unsafe kerosene lamps or camp fires for a source of light. In 2013, the Foundation continued its exciting Lighting Up The Track initiative and has now distributed 5,000 solar lights to every adult living along and in the catchment area of the Kokoda Track. The program has resulted in enormous benefits for the Kokoda Track region including: reduced respiratory and related health issues; children able to do their homework after dark; parents able to work on small businesses at night; and improved physical safety of women. Every village in the Koiari region of the Track has participated in theprogram as well as many across the Orokaiva and Northern Beaches regions.

SOLAR LIGHTS & MICROLENDING

Following on from the success of Lighting Up The Track, in 2013 we continued to distribute lights via our unique microlending model. Woking with women's groups only, the Foundation lends solar lights (instead of cash) to women across the region who then sell their lights at a profit and re-pay the cost of the light to the Foundation. The results to date have been extraordinary. We have a 100% loan repayment rate and the lights continue to be extremely popular - among local community members, visiting Papua New Guineans, and Australian trekkers. The women also set up maintanence shops where they conduct repairs on broken lights and change batteries (which require replacing after 3 years). The lights are being distributed to even more remote locations and women are benefitting as a result of the microlending support program.

INVESTING IN HIGH QUALITY TEACHERS


ELEMENTARY TEACHER TRAINING

In 2013, the Foundation continued to develop and pilot its Certificate of Elementary Teaching in PNG. Working with a cohort of 40 teacher trainees, the training was run out of the Foundation's community hall in Kou Kou village and was attended by teacher trainees from across the Orokaiva and Koiari regions. The innovative training program has extended the existing 6-week training course in PNG to a 12 month program that will be run out of the Kokoda College form 2014/2015. Teachers are exposed via critical thinking and action learning to new and innovative ideas about teaching, pedagogy, behaviour management, and classroom practices and our results to date have been outstanding. In 2013, 40 teachers grauated from the program providing vital resources for the remote schools across the Orokaiva region.

EDUCATION VOLUNTEERING PROGRAM

Committed volunteers provide an extraordinary amount of added value to the Foundation's education programs and 2013 saw some amazing cases of dedication, skills development, and motivation via our Education Volunteering Program.

Teachers from all walks of life in Australia were supported to travel to many remote regions in the Oro Province and provide mentoring, teacher development, and classroom management support to schools. In 2013, teachers were posted into schools in Alola, Abuari, Isurava, Kokoda, and Gorari and other teachers spent time volunteering via our teacher training program in Kou Kou village. Most teachers in rural PNG do not have opportunities to upskill or receive third party mentoring and support and this program has helped to improve teaching practices and provide a higher quality of education for the remote areas that need it most.

PROMOTING HEALTHY COMMUNITIES

COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKER TRAINING PROGRAM

Via our Community Health Worker training program we are working towards our goal of ensuring every village along and around the Kokoda Track has access to free, accessible and high quality healthcare. In 2013, we supported the training of another six community health workers who are graduating in the first half of 2014. These CHWs complete a 2.5 year training program and compulsoy midwifery extension program before being posted to remote communities throughout our region. A number of these CHWs will be posted into the Orokaiva aid posts after they graduate including Alola, Abuari, Kou Kou and Buna. Our CHWs also undergo regular training and upskilling and receive ongoing mentoring and support. CHWs conduct monthly immunisation patrols to all of their catchment communities as well as maternal health outreach services that ensure expecting and new mothers have access to vital pre-natal and neo-natal healthcare.

HEALTH VOLUNTEERING PROGRAM

In 2013 we continued to support volunteer health professionals to travel to PNG and provide mentoring support for our community health workers. These volunteers make regular trips throughout the year and provide vital training and support in midwifery and maternal health including infant health and wellbeing, breast feeding, nutrition, and wound and infection management. This training and mentoring provides vital moral support and guidance for our CHWs who are manning the remote aid posts along and around the Track. This year we expanded the program to include an important focus on oral hygiene and accessing dental services as well as Hepatitis B awareness and immunisation. A huge thank you to all of our health volunteers.





INVESTING IN AGRICULTURE & FOOD SECURITY

VILLAGE AGRICULTURE AND FOOD SECURITY PROJECT

Many communities in the Oro Province are faced with food security issues after regular natural disasters. Whole communities often go without food after periods of severe flooding and cyclones. The Foundation supports seed multiplication nurseries throughout the Province and imports improved strains of agriculture to help communities restart their food gardens. Taro, sweet potato, cassava and other fruits and vegetables are grown in our nurseries and distributed to hundreds of villagers in need throughout the Province. We also run ongoing training with community members across the Province in new planting techniques so that their crops are more likley to withstand periods of flooding. As a result, thousands of villagers across the Province now have regular access to the crops they need to restart their food gardens and to grow crops that will survive the harsh climate.

EMPOWERING WOMEN

PAWA GIVIM MERI

In 2013, the Foundation continued to run and expand its Pawa Givim Meri program - both along the Track and further into the Oro Province. We are now supporting women's groups in eleven communities along and around the Kokoda Track to earn a regular income via microbusiness and microlending initiatives. Via the microbusiness projects we run small business workshops, cooking classes, and literacy training with the women's groups in each community and assist them to establish catering businesses from which they can earn an income from the trekking industry.





NEW EDUCATION & HEALTH LANDSCAPE: KOKODA COLLEGE

Over the past 5 years, the Kokoda Track Foundation has invested significantly in the training of urgently needed Elementary Teachers and Community Health Workers for the Kokoda Track catchment region. Despite these efforts, however, we have struggled to gain the training positions for the number of teachers and health workers that are required to meet the enormous needs of our cacthment area. The exisiting training Colleges are full and there simply are not enough spaces available.

2013 saw enormous progress towards the Kokoda College thanks to the generosity of our donors and volunteers. We purchased the pre-fabricated construction materials from our suppliers, Tereno in Ulladulla, and these materials were shipped to Oro Bay via Lae and then transported down to Kou Kou village by our partners at Higaturu and USG. Significant progress was made on the clearing and levelling of the land and the construction of staff housing for the College.

In 2014, work will begin again as soon as the wet season finishes and we will construct the entire College campus: including the double classrooms, dormitories, mess hall, admin blocks and aid post. The Kokoda College will open in the second half of 2014 and will train teachers and health workers for the Kokoda catchment region. Our learning program will produce professionals of the highest quality for the region and the College will train enough teachers and CHWs for the immediate catchment region within its first 4 years of operations and can then open its doors and accept applicants from elsewhere in the country. Graduates will then be posted to operate the remote schools and aid posts across the region providing basic education and primary healthcare to hundreds of thousands of people in need.

INVESTING IN COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKERS

COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKER SUPPORT PROGRAM

Community Health Workers are the cornerstone of the PNG rural health system. The key to breaking the cycle of infant and maternal mortality in PNG is to give rural communities access to community health worker services and basic aid post facilities. Via these community health workers (who undertake a 2-year training diploma) mothers can access appropriate antenatal and postnatal care, immunizations and vaccinations, family planning options, and improved reproductive health. Furthermore, community health workers can address many of the major diseases that contribute to maternal and infant mortality in communities such as anaemia, malaria, nutrition, and postpartum haemorrhage. They also address communicable diseases including pneumonia, malaria, TB, syphilis, diarrhoeal diseases, meningitis, and HIV that account for 50 per cent of deaths in PNG each year.

In 2013, the Foundation focused on supporting more and more health workers across our region, with a large focus on the Northern Beaches region which has missed out on these health services for far too long. After re-opening the Buna Aid Post in 2012, in 2013 we supported our extremely dedicated team of CHWs to run the post and to provide primary health care to over 12 catchment communities. The health workers see up to 70 patients per day and conduct regular immunization and health promotion patrols throughout the region.





PROMOTING HEALTHY COMMUNITIES

AID POST RESOURCE & INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAM

In addition to supporting Community Health Workers, in order for aid posts to properly operate, they must receive a regular supply of drugs and other medical supplies. KTF supports the aid posts and health centres where its health workers are based and ensures that they have enough supplies to properly care for patients and provide healthcare to communities.

As well as supporting posts with medical supplies, we also work with local communities to build new infrastructure (aid posts and staff housing) and repair exisiting posts. Particular focus in 2013 was given to the Buna Aid Post and we worked to install solar panels for lighting and power and water tanks and polypipe systems to ensure that the post has a regular supply of fresh water. In 2014 we will work with the Buna community to conduct an extension on the post so that it can provide healthcare to more people and so that in-patients can be admitted and be provided with medical care overnight or for longer periods of time.

"We treat up to 70 patients per day at the Buna Aid Post and people travel long distances from 12 surrounding villages to access our health care services. Thanks to the solar lights provided by the Foundation, last week I delivered my first baby at Buna Aid Post under sufficient light rather than having to rely on mobile phones or wind up torches. I acknowledge the work of KTF in supporting the Buna Health Post with funding that enabled us to purchase the lighting and water system in this year 2013. RESPONDING TO AND PREPARING FOR DISASTERS

EMERGENCY FLOOD RELIEF

For the sixth year in a row, the Foundation responded to severe flooding in the Oro Province in 2013. Thousands of villagers were again affected by heavy rains and severe wind, resulting in hundreds of communities having their food gardens completely submerged by water.

The Foundation again partnered with the Red Cross PNG and arranged for an emergency distribution of food, water, shelter, and medical supplies to over 800 households in the affected region. In our direct catchment area, the villages of Buna, Gona, Sanananda, Eiwo and Kumusi were supported during the flooding as well as many other communities further along the coast in the Northern Beaches region of hte Oro Province.

The Foundation works with communities during the emergency period and supports them with the food and water supplies that they need to survive. After the emergency period ceases, we then work with this communities via our Food Security projects to help them re-establish their food gardens and to prepare them for future disaster periods.

"The food supplied by the Foundation kept us fed for two weeks while we waited for the floods to stop and the land to dry." (Pauline Ungaia, Recipient of Relief)







EDUCATION FOR ALL

FUZZY WUZZY ANGEL SCHOLARSHIPS

Our longest standing program is our Fuzzy Wuzzy Angel Scholarships which have been running for 11 years throughout the region. In 2013 we awarded our 1,400th scholarship for a student to attend school in PNG. Awarded on the basis of academic merit, gender equality and family need, the scholarships support students from across the region to attend primary and secondary schools and to also go onto tertiary studies across PNG.

The scholarships have a great motivational influence on students studying across the region and encourage children to commit to their studies and education to increase their chances of being awarded a scholarship in the following year.

As Free Education is slowly introduced across PNG, our scholarships are changing in form and transitioning from a traditional school-fee paying model to providing students with support via school resources, project fees, mentoring and other educational opportunities.

In our 11th year, we saw many of our scholarship recipients graduate from high school and go on to gain employment (in both the formal and informal sectors) or pursue opportunities for higher education opportunities across PNG. We are very proud of all of our scholarship recipients.

FINDING & FOSTERING THE NEXT GENERATION OF LEADERS

ARCHER LEADERSHIP SCHOLARSHIPS

In addition to developing the Kokoda Track catchment region, one of the Foundation's core objectives is to find and foster the next generation of PNG leaders. Via our Archer Leadership Scholarships we identify an annual cohort of emerging leaders from across PNG and support them on a yearlong, intensive, experiential scholarship that fosters their leadership knowledge, development and capacity. The scholarship fosters in the students the concepts, connections, and confidence they need to stand up and lead.

The scholarship aims to support and encourage the students' existing passions, connections to community, and visions for their country and to give them new perspectives and experiences, mentors and networks, and leadership and educational opportunities that result in the opening of leadership pathways at the end of the program. The long-term aim of the program is for the Archer graduates to end up in leadership positions in government, business, and civil society and to be committed to seeking positive change in PNG society.

In 2013, we supported our 3rd cohort of Archer Leaders - an extraordinary and impressive group of emerging leaders for PNG who have all gone on to achieve amazing results including full-time employment, community projects, and leadership positions.



He has written numerous best-selling books including the Spirit of Kokoda, the Spirit of the Digger, the Spirit of Gallipolli and Fromelles. 
Graeme Carroll Director (retired 23 May 2013)


